### Description:

**Chain of Custody:** The papers come from among the personal effects of Brother Joseph Schmitz that were donated by the Society of Mary sometime after his death on February 16, 1966.

**Biographical Note:** Joseph Schmitz (born Feb 12, 1905 in Staceyville, Iowa; died Feb 16, 1966 in San Antonio, Texas), joined the Society of Mary in 1922. He obtained a Master of Arts degree in history at Loyola University in Chicago in 1933 and a doctorate in 1939. He taught history at Saint Mary's University until 1961, when he became vice president for academic affairs. He was the first administrator of the special collections department during the 1940s. He served as president of the Texas State Historical Association. His publications include: *Thus They Lived, Daily Life in the Republic of Texas* (1936), *Texas Statecraft, 1836-1845* (1936), and *The Society of Mary in Texas* (1951). In 1960 a reprint edition of his first book was issued under the title *Texas Culture, 1826-1845*.

### **Research Notes**

Notes are typewritten or handwritten on cut sheets measuring approx. 7 7/8 x 4 7/8 inches

There is a paper tag found between the index cards reading Thus They Lived

The sheets are arranged by subject but not in alphabetical order; Some subjects repeat more than once. The archivist says that the cards are repackaged into one box having originally been in several containers. So it is possible that the cards were once grouped by book and have now become juxtaposed. There is a paper tag found between the index cards reading "Thus They Lived" which suggests that the cards behind it were used for that book.

The divider tabs separating the cards are fragile from acidification. Individual sheets have a cryptic (not always clear) source entry at upper left with a subject heading at upper right (sometimes). Subjects are Texas history from 1800s. Sources include published works and original materials.
