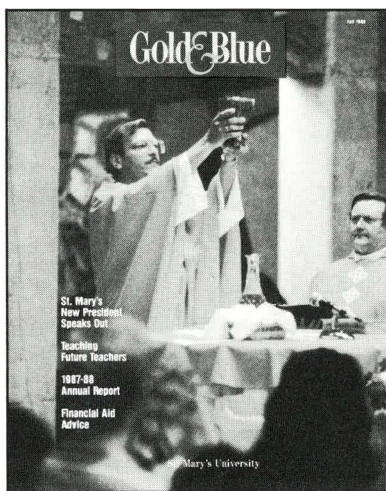

T H I S I S M Y V I S I O N

ST. MARY'S is an exciting place to be right now, and for me, an exciting place to be president.

In 1852 four French Brothers of Mary got off the stagecoach in the dusty streets of the village of San Antonio and started a school. They surely found Texas a far cry from the France they had left behind, and just as surely they did not know exactly all that their work would accomplish. But they came in response to God's call, and with a strong sense of mission and enthusiasm, to bring education to the frontiers of America.

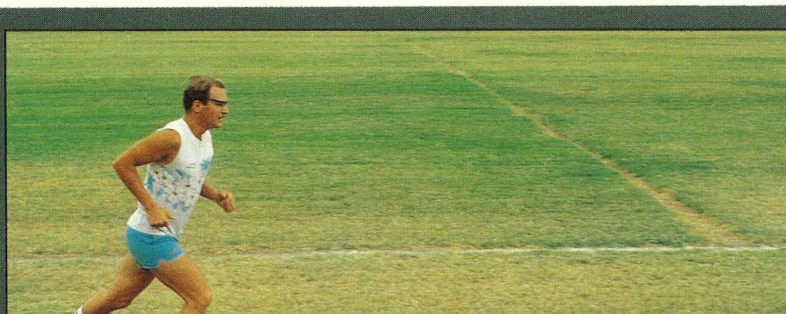
Today, 136 years later, we find ourselves in a position that is not so different. San Antonio has grown to become the ninth largest city in the U.S., and St. Mary's has grown with it to an enrollment this year of 3,700. The streets are not so dusty and the stage no longer runs from Galveston, but highway construction and the new modes of transportation are very much part of present-day San Antonio. The Marianists continue to respond to God's call, and our mission today is to bring education to the new frontiers of America and to an increasingly global society.

Since I took office on June 1, I have been thinking, writing and talking about the vision I have for St. Mary's. It is a vision in continuity with our past, but one that looks to the future—to the 21st century which is already almost upon us. The key themes of this vision are leadership and service. Let me say a bit about each.

I'd like St. Mary's graduates to be known as leaders—as people who are not only thoroughly competent in their professions, but who also have a vision which relates their work and their living to the larger project of making a better world. We should be concerned not only with making a living, but also with making a difference. The opportunity to develop such a larger vision is one of the goals

and fundamental service is to provide, each year, several hundred graduates well prepared to make their contributions to society. But beyond that, any university should be a forum for the discussion, exchange and development of ideas.

Our research at St. Mary's should extend the frontiers of knowledge both for its own sake and for the practical, and indeed crucial knowledge that will be needed in the 21st century. Moreover, a university like St. Mary's should be a home for, and an active supporter of, the arts, music, literature, painting and poetry. We should be a cultural resource for the community. Finally, we should be an active partner in the development of San Antonio and our South Texas region. We should

of our liberal arts core curriculum in professional degrees. A leader has an answer to the question, "What sort of world do I want to live in?" And the skills to make his or her answer to that question begin to become a reality.

Leadership in this sense is a form of service in the tradition of the Gospels: "The one who would be first among you is the one who serves the needs of all." Our St. Mary's community must continue to seek new ways to be a servant community. Our interactions with one another on campus should be marked by an attitude of "What can I do to help?"

Perhaps even more significantly, I have a vision of a university which consciously puts itself at the service of the larger community. Our first

be involved in shaping decisions which affect the area in which we make our home.

Of course, our resources are limited, and it may seem that our impact would be small. But 136 years ago, four brothers began a mission that has directly impacted the lives of over 22,000 people and indirectly shaped the education, life and destiny of the whole population of a region.

God's call to us is to work together to multiply the difference our lives can make in the world. And our St. Mary's community must be enthusiastically committed to that original mission of the Brothers of Mary—to bring education to the frontiers of the coming century.

Plan Early for College Costs

Financial assistance is often one of the most confusing areas families face in the entire college process. It is as misunderstood as it is important. To clear up the confusion many of our readers may have regarding financial aid, David R. Krause, director of the Office of Financial Assistance since 1984, discusses the rising cost of college education and what parents and students need to do in order to meet those costs. He is president-elect of the Texas Association of School Financial Aid Administrators.

Q. *Newsweek magazine revealed that 77 percent of Americans feel that the cost of college education is too high. Average tuition costs at American universities has risen at twice the rate of inflation in recent years. Why?*

A. It's true that the inflation rate is about three or four percent, and the rate of tuition increase at St. Mary's has been right around that national average of six or seven percent. But it's important to remember that the rate of tuition increase at St. Mary's held steady at seven percent during those years when the inflation rate was up around 16 or 17 percent. This meant the university had to defer a lot of maintenance costs.

As campus buildings grow older, they require more and more resources to maintain them. A lot of that upkeep was deferred during those high-inflation years. It finally got to a point where we could no longer afford not to undertake those maintenance costs.

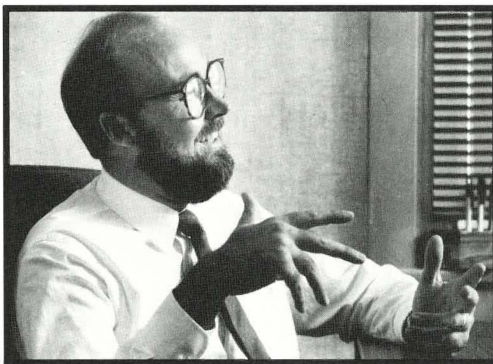
Also, much of the cost the university incurs—whether it be books for the library, textbooks for classes, or necessary equipment—has risen much faster than the inflation rate. But we still must make those purchases to ensure that St. Mary's has up-to-date books, up-to-date labs and up-to-date equipment in those labs.

Q. *In St. Mary's case, why must the money be generated through*

increased tuition, and not from other sources?

A. St. Mary's, unlike public schools, or schools with large endowments, is primarily tuition-driven. Approximately 75-80 percent of students' tuition payments goes directly toward the cost of their education, whereas in public schools, only about 20 percent of tuition is needed to cover direct educational costs; the rest is drawn from state subsidies or from the school's endowment.

The benefit of a large endowment is that it allows a school to keep up with its increasing annual



costs. Yet you'll find that some schools with very large endowments still find it necessary to raise tuition at a rate equal to, if not greater than, St. Mary's.

Q. *What do you see as the major role of your office in helping families meet the rising cost of a college education?*

A. I think the vast majority of students who consider St. Mary's do so for the quality of its educa-

tion. I see our main role as being in a partnership with the family, to help them meet the costs of that quality education.

Also in the partnership are the state and federal governments, which provide the largest percentage of student financial aid. Other partners are the university itself, which provides assistance from its own resources, and university donors, who provide scholarship and grant monies.

The most important member of the partnership is, of course, the family itself. Financing the student's college education has to be the top priority in the family budget. Since the student is the direct beneficiary of that education, his or her family has to provide what they can, based on their means.

Q. *How is a student's eligibility for financial aid determined?*

A. A student's eligibility is determined by analyzing the various financial aid forms which they must submit. Based on the financial information they supply, an estimate of the family's available resources is calculated according to federal guidelines. This calculation is the "expected family contribution," the amount the student and/or the parents should be able to apply toward the cost of a college education. That figure is then subtracted from the total education costs and the difference is the student's eligibility for financial assistance.

Q. *What are the most common misconceptions that families have concerning financial aid?*

A. One is the belief many families have that their savings will nullify their chances of receiving financial aid. People might be surprised to know that having \$20,000 in savings will have relatively little bearing on the student's financial aid

package, because the primary component which determines eligibility is the family's yearly income. Their savings may reduce the student's financial aid by only \$800 or \$900, since their expected family contribution will increase by that amount. Personally, I would gladly forfeit \$900 in outside aid if it meant that I had \$20,000 in savings to help cover my share of college costs.

Another misconception people have about private schools like St. Mary's is the assumption that their costs are unaffordable. Many students would like to obtain the quality education we offer at St. Mary's, but when they look at the price of tuition, fees, room and board, etc., they feel it is beyond their means. They don't realize that two-thirds of our students receive financial assistance, so what families actually pay is often much less than the total charges listed.

Q. *What advice would you give to families concerned about the rising costs of a college education?*

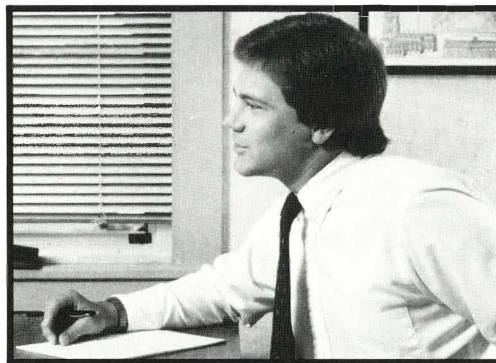
A. I would like to tell them to start planning for college expenses when the student is in the sixth or seventh grade. Today's college costs can sneak up on a family very rapidly, no matter what their income. It is much easier to save over a period of six years rather than six months, which is often the case. What having \$20,000, or \$10,000, or even \$5,000 in savings does is help ease the burden of financing their child's college education.

I've had calls from financial planners representing families interested in sending their children—who are only five or six years old—to St. Mary's. Of course we can't give them exact figures that far into the future, but we can give them a general idea of what it may cost. That way they

know approximately how much they will need to set aside on a yearly basis.

Timeliness is important also in applying for financial aid. Once student eligibility is determined, most funds are dispensed on a first-come, first-served basis. Many students think they must wait until the family's income tax returns are done before submitting their applications for financial aid. But if they have a stable income from year to year, they can file their paperwork using estimated figures. We can use those estimates to award them financial assistance. The amount of their award may change slightly if the estimates are inaccurate, but at least we will have reserved for them the maximum amount of aid they qualify for.

The hardest part of this job is having to tell a student and/or family that they cannot receive financial assistance, simply because there are no funds left; the eligi-



bility was met, but the filing deadlines were not.

Q. *What is the guiding philosophy of your office?*

A. St. Mary's prides itself on offering a very personalized education, so it's important when students come into our office that they get personal attention. I want every family to leave here knowing that we've done our best to assist them with their college costs.

Q. *Do you feel that your new offices will improve the quality of your services?*

A. Absolutely. Personal finances and means of paying college costs are probably the most emotional issues a family faces in discussing education plans. Our new office—and the personnel in it—allows us to offer private, comfortable financial-aid counseling—the type of treatment people have come to expect from St. Mary's.

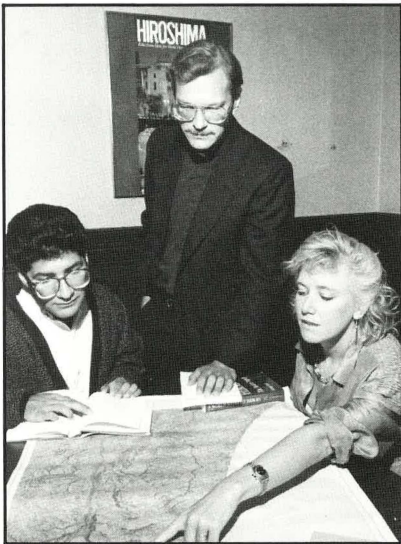
Q. *Where would you like to see St. Mary's—and this office in particular—headed five years from now?*

A. Although I'm very comfortable with where we are now, I think adhering to the status quo can sometimes be equated with stagnation. The reason I find this type of work enjoyable is because it can change so rapidly. Laws change and you have to adapt. I believe we may soon see some type of educational IRA program that allows tax breaks for families

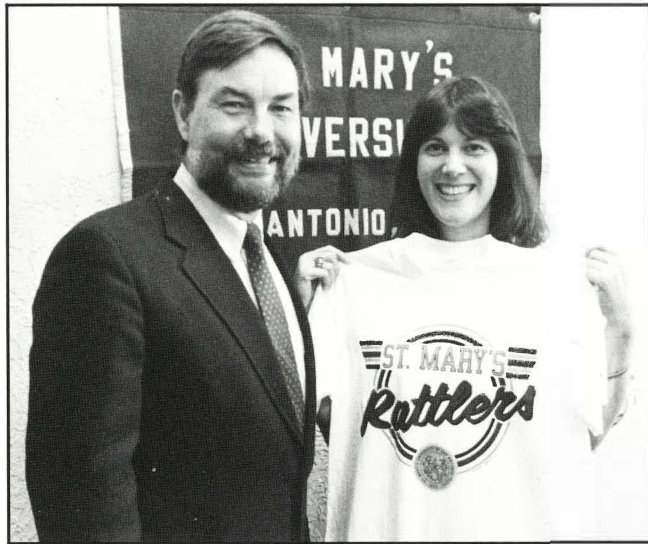
who use savings to pay for college education. There's talk of similar ideas with U.S. savings bonds.

We must always be trying to find new ways to help families finance their education plans and, most important, be aware of the continuing need to implement changes that will help us better serve St. Mary's students. ■

Law Dean Retiring

James N. Castleberry Jr. will retire as dean of the law school June 1, 1988. As dean emeritus, he will continue to develop the school's fund-raising program. He has served 10 years as dean and 33 years on the law faculty.

After a year's sabbatical, he will teach a class as well as work on development.

Dr. Barry Abrams, enrollment management vice president, is chairman of the search committee for a new dean.

Peace and Justice Minor

An 18-hour peace and justice minor is available at St. Mary's for the first time this fall. The new field of study offers two areas of concentration: either national and international peace, or national and international justice. The minor also requires international or community field work such as on-site study of the peace movement in Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

The program was developed by St. Mary's four-year-old President's Peace and Justice Commission.

Selected by Stanford

Senior electrical engineering student Marcos Cimadevilla was one of 10 students participating in a Stanford University research program held in the summer.

The eight-week program was designed to stimulate minority students toward doctoral degrees in the fields of research and teaching. The study included a research project with a faculty mentor, seminars and group tours.

Cimadevilla was selected from 242 applicants. He received round-trip travel, laboratory expenses and a stipend of \$3,000.

Schools Sign Agreement

The Rev. John Moder and Dr. Terry Dicianna, the respective presidents of St. Mary's and Palo Alto College, a two-year institution, signed an articulation agreement to allow students to earn an associate degree at Palo Alto, then transfer credits to St. Mary's for completion of a bachelor's degree.

The agreement will apply to biology/premedicine, pre-dentistry, chemistry, physics and business administration.

Intern Program With the City

St. Mary's coordinated the academic program of two city administrators from Monterrey, Mexico, who interned in San Antonio city hall offices. The city's International Relations Department made arrangements for faculty members to supervise the interns' work through the university's master's degree program in public and institutional administration. One of the visitors headed Monterrey's Urban Planning Department; the other was floor manager of Monterrey's Department of Buildings.

Physical Plant Award

St. Mary's has won the 1988 Regional Award for small campus Excellence in Facilities Management in the central states region of the Association of Physical Plant Administrators of Universities and Colleges. The award was presented to Charles Jenkins, director of Physical Plant, during the group's 75th annual meeting held in Washington, D.C.

Lamm-Tennant Takes Leave

Dr. Joan Lamm-Tennant, business school, has been granted a leave of absence from January 1, 1989, through May 31, 1990, to accept a position as visiting associate professor at Villanova University. She will also work with Peat, Marwick, Main and Co. accounting firm on Wall Street.

Board Elections

Rupert Hays, formerly acting chairman of the board of trustees, was unanimously confirmed as chairman at the September meeting of the board. He is chairman of the board for Victoria Mortgage Co. Pat Legan, owner of Legan Properties, was unanimously voted vice chairman. Frank W. Baker, partner in the law firm of Matthews and Branscomb, will continue in his position of secretary to the board.

Goelz Honored

Dr. Paul Goelz, S.M., director of the business school's A.H. Meadows Center for Entrepreneurial Studies, was one of seven entrepreneurs honored by the Arthur Young accounting firm and Venture magazine in a competition for Entrepreneur of the Year. The winners were recognized at a dinner held at the Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio.

ST. MARY'S topped enrollment at 3,835 in the fall of 1987—the highest since 1972.

Total enrollment increased 9 percent above the previous year; undergraduate enrollment went up more than 7 percent; and graduate student enrollment hit a 24 percent increase.

Law school applications were eight percent over last year. (Law enrollment is intentionally limited to approximately 650 as a policy.)

The incoming freshman class of 489 students was the largest in eight years, representing 19 states, 9 countries and 44 of the 52 high schools in the greater San Antonio area.

One-third of our new students were in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class, with almost 50 percent more valedictorians and salutatorians than the year before.

Moreover, these entering students showed an increase of 22 points in SAT math scores and 4 points in verbal scores over the previous year.

Incoming freshmen's chosen majors were: humanities 32 percent; business 32 percent; and sciences 28 percent.

Seventy-eight students received academic scholarships averaging \$2,800 and totaling \$218,400.

We Helped Our Students Help Themselves

The federally funded Health Careers Opportunity Program prepared minority students for admission to medical and dental schools with a grant of \$346,133. Since the program began in 1985, 133 premedical and pre-dental students have received stipends to attend summer programs to prepare them for the Medical College Admission Test and the Dental School Admission Test, take special courses at the San Antonio

Stanley Kaplan Education Center, and meet with University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio faculty and students to become familiar with medical school procedures.

Our Title III federal grant of \$600,000 was awarded to fund five separate programs:

- 1.) Writing-Across-the-Curriculum, designed to ensure that all graduating students achieve writing proficiency.
- 2.) Academic and Career Advising, intensified to help students plan major fields of study appropriate to their career objectives.
- 3.) Outcomes Assessment, a plan to consistently evaluate curricula and students' performance.
- 4.) A Bachelor of Science Degree in manufacturing engineering, enhanced by the installation of model robots such as a computerized shop-floor management system and an automatic high-rise storage and retrieval unit.
- 5.) A Summer Program to provide incoming students with courses designed to strengthen their math, writing, study skills and adjustment to college life.

We're Making Business Sense

St. Mary's provided the business community with lively topics of discussion at well-attended breakfast meetings sponsored by the business school's Meadows Center for Entrepreneurial Studies. Early risers learned about "Funding Ventures in the High Technology Industry," "The Commercialization of Biomedical Research and Technology" and "Succeeding in High Technology."

The School of Business and Administration's annual Business Week went international with the theme, "Business and Its Global Outlook." A leading West German

expert on East German problems spoke on "Capitalism vs. Communism: A Comparison of Business in East and West Germany."

We Answered the Needs of Our Students

A new Bachelor of Science degree in biochemistry, in line with increasing career opportunities in biotechnology, was offered to meet the needs of students considering health careers. The new degree emphasizes the biochemical and clinical applications of physical and analytical chemistry.

A graduate course in manufacturing engineering was developed to strengthen expertise in competing with foreign trade.

Students seeking careers in public justice can now earn a double major that can be teamed up with psychology, sociology or political science, without adding course hours or extending graduation beyond four years of study.

We're Assuring Success Through Continuity

Biological sciences graduates continued to be accepted by medical and dental schools at twice the average rate for U.S. universities.

St. Mary's was cited by the Association of American Medical Colleges for providing the second largest number of Hispanic students entering American medical schools.

Law school graduates ranked second in the July 1987 Texas Bar results with 88.23 percent of students passing the exam.

We're Growing and Going Residential

A record number of 1,100 undergraduate students filled our 10 residence halls.

Archbishop Patrick Flores blessed a new student residence hall named in his honor at a campus dedication ceremony. Naming the hall for the archbishop symbolizes the historical relationship of St. Mary's with the

San Antonio community and the Catholic Church in South Texas.

A 24-hour computer room for resident student use in Dougherty Hall Women's Residence was equipped with six IBM computers with dual floppy-disk drives and three printers.

The much-needed renovation of Gami Science Hall began in early spring 1988.

The Treadaway Quadrangle got a new look this summer, enhancing the university cafeteria, Guadalupe Chapel, Treadaway Auditorium, Treadaway Women's Residence and several Treadaway offices.

Faculty Achievers

The Rev. John Rechten became the eighth St. Mary's professor and the third from the English department to be chosen as a Piper Professor.

John Schmolesky, law school, was awarded a Fulbright teaching fellowship at the School of Law of Catholic University, Rio de Janeiro.

Vincent Johnson, associate professor of law, was chosen from 150 nationwide candidates to serve as a U.S. Supreme Court judicial fellow in the Office of the Chief Justice, Washington, D.C.

The San Antonio Jaycees chose law professor Gerald Beyer, Dr. Joan Lamm-Tennant, business school, and Dr. Daniel Rigney, Sociology Department, as outstanding men and women for distinguished service to the community.

Law professor Mark Cochran was named professor-in-residence with the United States Treasury Department.

Our Students Aimed High

St. Mary's law students for the first time won the regional mock trial contest spon-

St. Mary's law students for the first time won the regional mock trial contest sponsored by the Association of Trial Lawyers of America. Two second-year law students placed first in the competition traditionally won by third-year law students.



sponsored by the Association of Trial Lawyers of America. Two second-year law students placed first in the competition traditionally won by third-year law students.

The fledgling debate team competed at the national Junior Division Debate Tournament. Two students were the first in the school's history to qualify for the prestigious tournament. The final results ranked St. Mary's among the top 50 teams in the country. St. Mary's was the only Texas representative in

the Cross-examination Debate Association division, which focuses on value-oriented debate.

"You Are the Future," a challenge to today's youth by Pope John Paul II set the theme for a student rally for five universities and colleges on the St. Mary's campus as the pontiff made his way to San Antonio. The rally gave students the opportunity to discuss issues facing society today.

Financial Report

In the year ending May 31, 1988, internal fiscal controls continued to be strengthened.

As a result of these and other improved management practices, the current fund showed an increase of \$72,921 on operating revenues of approximately \$29.4 million.

As is traditional, tuition and fees comprised approximately 66 percent of the

university's operating revenues. Faculty and supporting staff salaries and benefits, and general educational activities accounted for more than 82 percent of the university's expenditures.

The school's endowment reached \$14.9 million and the value of the campus buildings and plant more than \$58 million.

Preparing Teachers

WHICH WAY TO GO?



Teacher Education in Texas and at St. Mary's is breaking out of restriction and constriction into an area of innovative teacher-preparation programs.

The 1984 State Board of Education ruling that required uniform standards for Texas teacher education set the framework for comprehensive, specific, but rather rigid requirements for preparing teachers. However, the State Board of Education (SBOE) put all programs on hold and extended the deadline for the implementation of the new requirements. The SBOE is the appointed board that took office as a result of Texas law (House Bill 72). That appointed board will be replaced by an elected board in January 1989. Now, if the newly elected board will leave teacher education alone for a while,

innovative programs will flourish across Texas.

Through all of the turmoil, teacher education at St. Mary's has remained alive and well. An air of excitement developed when new programs under the 1984 standards were planned, but the excitement waned as implementation dates were postponed many times. Finally, the 1984 standards were revised into the 1987 standards, which strengthened general freshman and sophomore education required for teacher-ed students to 60 semester hours, including areas such as computer literacy, speaking ability, algebra, humanities and fine arts.

St. Mary's had already anticipated the trend toward more general education with its university-wide core curriculum. The new St. Mary's core curriculum made the development of teacher-education programs under the 1987 standards a less complicated task because our students more than met the general education required by the state.

Senate Bill 994, passed in summer 1987, placed a controversial cap of only 18 hours, including student teaching, on education courses, and also eliminated education as a major in all Texas universities.

The elimination of education as a major will not cause a problem for St. Mary's. Our secondary certification students have always majored and minored in teaching fields and at the same time completed an appropriate sequence of courses in education. Now, our elementary certification students will do the same thing. Elementary certification students will be encouraged to major in a cluster of complementary courses which cover fields taught in the elementary school and, in addition, they will complete a sequence of education courses.

The SB-994 limitation of 18 semester hours for education courses is the problem. Some people think such a limitation is an improvement, but I think the limit is too severe, because education courses include more than methods of teaching. Our education courses always have included academic content, and I believe there is just too much academic content to be covered to cut those hours down

from 24 to 18. One solution being proposed to comply with the new limitation of 18 hours of education courses is to shift some course content to other academic departments. Another possibility is to distinguish between non-education content and education content within an education course. If the non-education content is 60 percent or more, the course will not be part of the 18-hour limit.

St. Mary's has never been satisfied with minimums and rightly so. For example, before the SBOE required a content-reading course for secondary certification, St. Mary's program had that requirement. The SBOE required a minimum of 24 hours for a secondary teaching field. Several St. Mary's programs require 30 hours. We, as professional educators, have been allowed to determine the content of our programs. Now SB-994 puts a maximum on teacher-education courses regardless of professional recommendations.

One major area of SB-994 yet to be explored calls for a year of induction into teaching as a

capstone to teacher-certification programs. The induction year, which is a beginning graduate's first teaching year, will include special assistance from the employing school district and a university to help beginning teachers succeed. At the end of the induction year, certification will be complete.

The induction year will offer beginning teachers the opportunity to improve and extend skills and abilities learned in teacher-certification programs. The beginner's teaching will be blended with suggestions, advice and examples from school and university personnel. In short, the induction year will be a year of skills refinement and support for beginning teachers.

The legislature has yet to discuss the costs for the induction year. I hope the program will not be abandoned because of extensive costs. In January 1989, a new SBOE takes office and the legislature meets again. The prospects are not stable.

Throughout all the changes and confusion since 1984, St. Mary's teacher education has attempted to maintain a quality program for teacher certification. Our graduates do well on the Examination for Certification of Educators in Texas (ExCET). Our graduates get jobs. By Christmas 1988, St. Mary's faculty in most departments will have developed new programs to comply with the 1987 standards, and we shall continue to produce quality teachers, as we have in the past.

St. Mary's by no means intends to remain static in its teacher-preparation programs. Our teacher-education programs will continue to be dynamic—constantly monitored and revised. The creativity of St. Mary's faculty will ensure quality certification programs regardless of limitations which may be applied by the state. ■

PROJECT 30

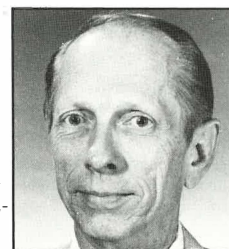
This is the name of a teacher-education project that includes St. Mary's in the 30 colleges and universities selected nationwide to work on redesigning teacher education with the support of a Carnegie Corp. grant.

St. Mary's is one of three higher-education institutions in Texas and one of three Catholic universities invited to take part in rebuilding their prospective teachers' curriculum.

The change: teams of education, arts and sciences faculty at each university to work together to forge "a new plan of learning" that will address these issues: prospective teachers' understanding of subject matter; entitling teachers as professionals; pedagogical-content knowledge; minority participation in teaching; international and multicultural perspectives.

St. Mary's bid for inclusion in the project in competition with 100 colleges said, in part: "Given the strong Roman Catholic Hispanic component of our student body and our commitment to teacher training for that minority group especially, we believe that our participation in Project 30 would also provide a significant model for other minority teacher-training programs across the country."

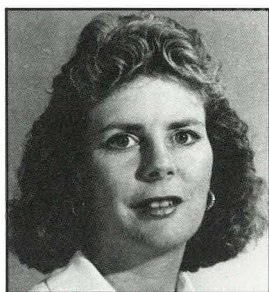

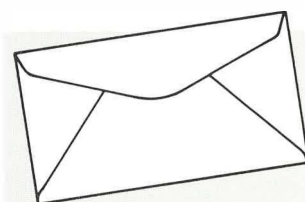
